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UUH OUTREACH

Unitarian Universalist House (UUH) Outreach provides individualized, quality professional care that is responsive to the physical, emotional and intellectual needs of an older adult in the Northwest Philadelphia community. UUH provides services that include but are not limited to health promotion, social work service, client assistance fund distribution, and special projects.

BACKGROUND/CONTEXT

The Northwest Philadelphia clientele are primarily Black and otherwise diverse, older adults who have been living in the area for decades, if not their whole lives. Many clients qualify for a number of state-assistance programs that can be overwhelming to manage for an individual. The effects of COVID-19, too, on the clients' resilience, mental health, and personal losses have had an acute effect on Northwest Philadelphia's tight communities.

TEAM'S EXPERIENCE

The Bridging the Gap Interns assisted with the multi-faceted services that UUH Outreach provides to their clients. Throughout the summer, the interns met UUH clients for in-person visits, compiled resources for the client-base, connected clients with pertinent information, and put together a newsletter for an elder living community affiliated with UUH. The interns also assisted with setting up and running community-based events and updated the team on any medical issues that clients experience. Outside of their formal responsibilities, the interns spent their time making meaningful and personal connections with clients—many of whom endured long periods of isolation during the Covid-19 pandemic.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS/CHALLENGES/JOYS

Challenges:

COVID-19

- With the transition of many services to a virtual format and state personnel increasingly working from home, it has been harder to connect over the phone with service providers for elder support, which is often the fastest way to receive help.
- There has also been a push to digitize the bureaucratic process, creating greater obstacles for elders who are not as familiar with computers and smartphones trying to access city or state services.

Poverty

■ Several clients struggled significantly with their financials, which put pressure on their living conditions, physical health, and mental health.

Accumulation

■ In recent years, there has been a trend of increased accumulation of personal belongings in clients' homes. To help clients live independently in a sustainable manner, we were concerned about their environmental health (e.g. risk for falls).

Accomplishments:

- Organized and de-cluttered many different areas of clients' homes and helped them build confidence to tackle problems and help them build their version of a healthy life
- Helped clients identify motivations to reduce smoking and connected them with smoking cessation resources
- Connected elders with fresh produce vouchers and wrote recipes for income-accessible, seasonally-minded, nutritious meals in a monthly newsletter

Joys:

- We learned about the rich history of Germantown through countless remembered stories
- We are excited to know that there are organizations that exist to support and maintain community through healthcare and social work
